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Dear Parents and Carers,

I am writing to you today regarding year six pupils returning to school. School has been closed to pupils since Friday 20th March and I am now pleased to inform you that from Monday 8th June school will be reopening for year six pupils. I am sure you may have questions or concerns, through this letter I hope to address these issues.

Year six is an important milestone in a child's educational journey and I am delighted we will be able to welcome pupils back to school for the final half-term before they move on to secondary education. Returning to school will allow pupils to see their friends and members of staff once again. This period will allow us to support pupils in the preparation for moving to their new school. Whilst we will not be able to enjoy our traditional end of year six activities including trips, the year six performance or graduation, we will endeavour to give pupils the opportunity to say goodbye to St Margaret's in a way they will remember.

Vulnerable children and households where someone is vulnerable.

Sadly, pupils who are clinically extremely vulnerable or living in a household where someone is clinically extremely vulnerable will not be able to attend school at this time. We recommend pupils who are clinically vulnerable or living in a household with someone who is clinically vulnerable should not attend school at this time. We ask if you intend to send a child to school and they are clinically vulnerable or they are living with someone who is clinically vulnerable that you discuss this with school before returning.

The school day

The school day for pupils in year six will start at 8.30am and finish the day at 3pm. It is very important pupils arrive and are collected on time. School will close for year six pupils at 12.30pm each Friday. This will allow a deep clean of the school premises to take place. Unfortunately, until further notice it will not be possible for pupils to cycle to school.

The start and end of the day

Pupils should enter school via the main playground. The school gates will open at 8.15am. Members of staff will be on the playground to supervise from 8.15am. When pupils arrive, they should go to the line for their bubble. Each bubble will be signposted and there will be clear markings on the playground to ensure adequate social distancing. At the end of the school day, pupils will be collected from the same place they are dropped off. If pupils are walking to school, they must ensure they are socially distancing (two meters away) from other pupils. If you have concerns that your child cannot observe this rule, we recommend you bring them to school. We recognise on Monday that this routine will be new for all pupils. On Monday, when pupils arrive, members of staff will take them into the school hall where adequate social distancing will be in place. Members of staff will then welcome pupils back, explain the new routines and place pupils into their bubbles.

Bubbles

Pupils will be placed in bubbles of no more than fifteen. Pupils will be placed in bubbles based on a range of factors. We will, where possible, ensure pupils are in groups with their friends and a familiar adult. As bubbles are limited to fifteen pupils it will not be possible to place each pupil with their teacher. During the school day, each bubble will be isolated from the other bubbles in school. The idea of pupil bubbles is to prevent pupils mixing or coming into contact with other groups of pupils. It will not be possible to move pupils between bubbles.

Attendance

The government have deemed it safe for school to reopen for more pupils. We would encourage pupils to attend daily. We recognise that some parents and carers may not want their children to return or that you only want to send your children to school on certain days. We understand at this time that you may have concerns regarding your children attending school more often than you feel necessary. Ultimately, this is your choice as parents and carers and we will support the decision you make.

Uniform

Pupils are not required to wear school uniform. We would expect pupils to wear a fresh set of clothes each day.

COVID-19 symptoms

If a pupil or member of their household displays COVID-19 [symptoms](#) they must not attend school. Where households are displaying symptoms, we would expect people to get [tested](#). If a pupil displays symptoms in school, they will be isolated in school and parents or carers will be contacted to collect their child. In this scenario, the expectation will be that your child is tested for COVID-19 and school must be informed of the test result. If a pupil in your child's bubble displays symptoms and subsequently tests positive, parents will be informed and pupils in that bubble will then be sent home to [isolate](#) for seven days, other members of the household should isolate for fourteen days.
